Data Snapshot 2021-2022

Academic Success 7,690

- 3,723 children served reached developmental milestones
- 93% of student served by a Mentor improved functioning in school
- 4,082 preschool children received free vision screening

Health & Independence

5.834

18 programs

- 1,130 seniors received services to remain independent in their home
- 4,068 families' basic and emergency needs were met
- 274 individuals served by Domestic Violence programs

Self-Sufficiency

1.860

7 programs

- 1,749 were served to reduce the societal impacts of trauma, substance abuse and mental illness
- 112 participated in programs for personal and professional development
- 80% received counseling services and increased their critical thinking and problem-solving skills

Ready Workforce

7,996

6 programs

- 88% of students increased their knowledge about the dangers of drugs and alcohol
- 1,311 students completed a career exploration program
- 7,996 individuals served in workforce readiness programming funded by UWSCC



871 volunteers


engaged in & supported UW funded programs, contributing to over 23,380 positive impacts. The value of volunteer time is \$29.95 per hour.

Collaboration Examples in Programming

- Ongoing and multiple "warm hand offs" to community agencies and programs to effectively meet the needs of individuals.
- Many agencies and programs involved with Multidisciplinary Teams & Mobile Crisis Teams.
- Many agencies involved in cross sector Coalitions to address community needs.
- Programming embedded in Chautauqua County School districts and connections with Higher Education Institutions.
- VITA program provided critical services to nonprofits (staff and clients). Identified the need to do more intentional and early outreach to clients about VITA services.
- New relationships with regional funders and local businesses to grow and diversify revenue.
- Increased and more intentional county wide collaborative efforts.



HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION RATES 2018 - 2022




According to data from 2018-2022, students involved with UWSCC funded programs have a higher graduation rate as compared to the graduation rate of NYS for the same time period.

Equitable Engagement Examples in United Way Funded Programs


- Direct outreach to organizations that work directly with Hispanic and Latino communities.
- Efforts to ensure program staff and participants reflect the communities served.
- Trainings provided to address unconscious biases, cultural competency, and cultural responsiveness.
- Barriers discovered that may be preventing people from engaging in services provided by community agencies.
- Identified staff position(s) and trainings to support LGBTQ+ individuals and communities.
- Policy changes and amendments to be more culturally responsive to meet needs of individuals and directly impacted populations.
- Bilingual staff hired and retained by many agencies.
- Formation of DEI committees and development of DEI statements.
- Efforts to increase diversity of staff, Board, and volunteers.
- Wages increased to ensure all staff have a livable wage

Emerging Community Needs

- Increased referrals and need for services provided by United Way funded programs.
- Systems Challenges:
 - Transportation
 - Safe and affordable housing &homelessness
 - o Safe, high quality, affordable childcare and after school support & care for students
- Staff turnover and finding qualified, reliable staff to support programming. Increase in mental health issues, burnout, and anxiety in staff and volunteers.
- Mental health needs and issues of individuals served.
- Increased services for those affected by substance use disorder along with continued increased need and complex issues surrounding drug use.
- Multiple barriers impacting people in poverty and ALICE* families. Systems are not set up to help the "working poor" and the Benefits Cliff* needs to be addressed.
- Need to address social emotional skills of students, parents, and the community at large and the ability to use effective communication, social skills, and coping with negative emotions in a healthy way.
- Lack of workforce readiness skills.
- Challenge of educating the community about the ongoing need for supportive services.
