We are deeply grateful for the tireless efforts of our community-including our volunteers, generous donors, top-notch staff, resilient non-profit agencies, and the many, many partners in this work. ALICE (Asset, Limited, Income Constrained, Employed)

This year, UWSCC developed an educational and engagement tool designed to build knowledge and empathy for an often-invisible population in our community when we talk about poverty: ALICE (Asset, Limited, Income Constrained, Employed). In 2021, more than 16,051 of Chautauqua County's 126,807 individuals were ALICE. ALICE households have an income above the federal poverty level but are still struggling to afford basic household necessities.



This demographic, in addition to those below the federal poverty level, means that 48% of households in Chautauqua County experience financial hardship. Through the ALICE Experience, participants learn about the challenging decisions that ALICE families make daily, bringing to light the realities faced by people who live in financial hardship and the ripple effect this has on our community. Groups are assigned a family profile and must build a budget within the limitations of their assigned family. The ALICE Experience is a powerful engagement tool that often challenges one's understanding of financial hardship and reveals important insights about an often invisible need in our community.

United Way of Southern Chautauqua County



The annual community baby shower continued this year through the collection of baby items and monetary gifts from the community, sponsored by UPMC Chautauqua, Jamestown Pediatric Associates, Lane Women's Health Group, Jamestown Prendergast Library, and Wegmans. Items collected through various community groups were distributed among local agencies who provide direct services and support to babies and mothers in Chautauqua County. The community raised \$628 and collected baby essentials and supplies for a total value of \$6,649. Agencies receiving items collected from the Community Baby Shower include The Baby Café, Chautauqua County Department of Maternal & Infant Health, Catholic Charities (WIC), Jamestown Community Learning Council, Mental Health Association, Salvation Army ANEW Center, SPREE (Jamestown Community College), Community Helping Hands, TEAM (YWCA Jamestown) and Transitions Housing (YWCA Jamestown).

Vickye James Blueprint Fund

Vickve James was a member of the Board of Directors of United Way for seven years and served as Board President from 2008-2010. She was one of only four female presidents during the 122-year history of United Way, and the only African American to ever serve as president. She was passionate about serving her community, empowering youth, and giving voice to historically marginalized people in the City of Jamestown. A well-respected leader in City Government, the Church, and the non-profit sector, she was widely known for working for social justice and saw leadership development as a path to achieving it. One of her accomplishments during her tenure at United Way was to support the implementation of "Project Blueprint," a multi-year initiative that helped

promote volunteerism on non-profit boards and committees—with a special focus on people of color—by guiding participants in acquiring skills necessary for board membership through training, exposure, and direction. In honor of her legacy, United Way of Southern Chautauqua County created the Vickye James Blueprint Fund. The first recipients of the funding include:

Girls in Sports



WNY Girls in Sports, established in 2006 by Mary Wilson to promote sports and fitness to girls ages 9-12, made a big impact in Chautauqua County this year. United Way of Southern Chautauqua County partnered with United Way of Buffalo & Erie County to host a Western New York Girls in Sports event at the Jefferson Middle School fieldhouse. Girls were given the opportunity to sample sports, hear from an inspirational speaker, and engage with women leaders from our community. There were 70 girls that participated in the event along with a combined total of 50 volunteers that made the event possible

This event included four sports sampling stations made possible by coaches, student athletes and volunteers from JHS Girls' Basketball, JHS Track & Cross Country, Southern Tier Football Club, and Yoga with Lotus Healing Center. Local community volunteers that supported the event included United Way of Southern Chautauqua County, AAUW, Chautauqua Region Community Foundation, YWCA Jamestown, and Women and Chautauqua County Coalition of Women and Girls.

VITA Program (Volunteer Income Tax Assistance) VITA files free taxes for individuals and working families who make \$73,000 or less per year, as well as persons with disabilities, limited-English taxpayers and persons 60 years and older.

United Way of Northern Chautauqua County and United Way of Southern Chautauqua County shared a VITA Program Administrator, who provided support and coordination to fifty eight volunteers. These volunteers prepared taxes, assisted with intake information, and provided site coordination—logging more than 3,500 hours of service to the community. This year VITA volunteers assisted approximately 2,100 individuals, and 1,550 households, filed 1,470 tax returns, and brought back \$2,172,107.00 in refunds. 1,025 of the individuals were over 60.

2022 Joseph H. Mason Award



James M. Cama, a member of the Jamestown Teachers Association, was the recipient of the 2022 Joseph H. Mason Award. Jim is a second-grade teacher at Lincoln Elementary Schools and an active member of the Jamestown Teachers Association. He shows dedication to his union in a multitude of ways and is willing to serve in whatever capacity needed. He is a past coordinator of JTA Battle of the Businesses and also participates in IMPACT for Educators at Lincoln Elementary School. He is very active in the community and has been an integral part of the Hands-on Jamestown Neighborhood clean-up event. Jim and his wife Emily are also Realtors at ERA Team VP Real Estate. Jim shares his love for sports as a coach for a local baseball team and has served as a host for the Babe Ruth World Series. He and his family have also been hosts for a Rotary Exchange Student. Jim, his wife, and his four children live in West Ellicott and are very involved with Zion Covenant Church.

Business Meets Community: Impact Tours & Days of Caring

Every year, UWSCC coordinates Days of Caring and Impact Tours for local businesses and organizations. These are opportunities for individuals to volunteer as part of an employer team. They can also learn more about the issues affecting our community and how local nonprofits, supported by funding from United Way, are making an impact every day. United Way staff coordinates the site visits and volunteer projects at multiple agencies, and the day ends with a group reflection to discuss what was learned. Both the Impact Tours and Days of Caring show the value and importance of ongoing United Way funding for community partner agencies. They are also a great tool for team building and giving back to the community in a "hands-on" way.

Volunteer of the Year

Emergency Food and Shelter Program

United Way of Southern Chautauqua County administers and coordinates FEMA's ESFP funds throughout the County. Last year, Chautauqua County received \$57,138 to supplement emergency food and shelter programs. More than ten local organizations are impacted annually by these federal funds, including Catholic Charities, Salvation Army of Jamestown and Dunkirk, PathStone Corporation, St. Susan's Center, Dunkirk Meals on Wheels, Jamestown Area Meals on Wheels, FeedMore WNY, YWCA Jamestown, and the UCAN City Mission.

Formally launched on Juneteenth 2022, the I.D.E.A. Coalition (Inclusion, Diversity, Equity and Access) works to make Chautaugua County a place where everyone belongs and has opportunities to thrive, especially those who have been historically marginalized. Since its inception as informal conversations with several local institutions, the IDEA Coalition has grown from 18 to 40 members from across sectors. Coalition members spent the first part of the year formalizing the structure, leadership, and approach of the coalition. The second half of the year included facilitating a series of townhall meetings and listening sessions with Black and Latino communities in both Dunkirk and Jamestown. Six meetings were held, attended by more than 160 people of color. Their work also included a survey geared toward Black and Latino residents to get their feedback on challenges they are currently facing.

The coalition leadership used both the survey data and the townhall meetings to inform their work. This listening process ultimately identified thirteen concerns/barriers which "defined the challenge" using the comments and feedback from community members themselves: Racism/Discrimination, Language Barriers, Lack of Representation, Poverty/Financial Hardship, Business, Jobs/Employment, Housing, Education System, Public Safety, Community/Social Activities, Services/Resources, Health System/Mental Health, and Transportation. During a "data walk," community members reviewed the data and feedback collected during the townhall meetings, and used post it notes to add questions, share personal experiences in each of the areas, and to begin to offer their ideas for solutions. This process helped prioritize which concerns/barriers the coalition would tackle first. In their May meeting (which included 60 people in attendance), coalition members reviewed the top three priorities, as identified by communities of color:

Education System I Business/Employment I Community/Social Activities

The next steps will involve finalizing summaries of the identified priorities, as well as some of the solution themes that emerged from the May coalition meeting. The IDEA Coalition will be looking to identify three "solution teams" made up of coalition members, community members, and other key stakeholders.



The Capacity Lab

The Capacity Lab is a collaborative initiative to strengthen nonprofit leaders and organizations in Chautauqua County. United Way of Southern Chautauqua County is one of six local funders that works alongside Project Director, Noah Goodling, to combine efforts that seek to align resources and develop collaborative strategies to strengthen the nonprofit sector. This year's accomplishments include the first local cohort of graduates from the Institute for Nonprofit Practice (INP)-a program that equips nonprofit leaders with the skills, knowledge, and networks they need to make strategic, mission-driven decisions and effect meaningful change in their organizations and beyond. The Capacity Lab also coordinated a six-part non-profit board training workshop, the release of the first annual Chautauqua County Non-profit Salary and Benefits Survey, and provided several microgrants to local agencies designed to make strategic investments in learning how to build capacity. The Capacity Lab is supported by the Ralph C. Wilson, Jr. Foundation and local funders, including Chautauqua Region Community Foundation, Northern Chautaugua Community Foundation, Ralph C. 


